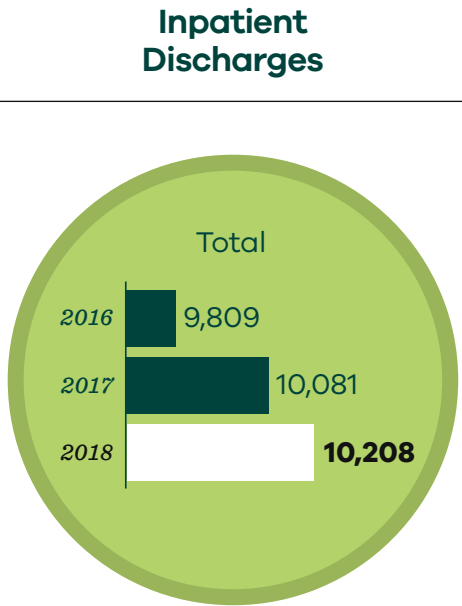
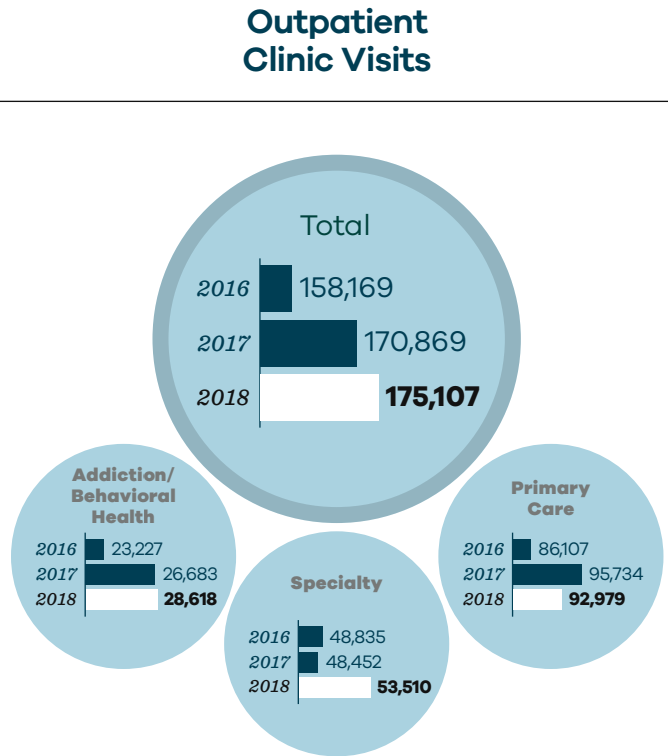
2018 by the numbers

Samaritan is committed to meeting our community’s needs through strong fiscal management and continuous investment into our facilities, services and staff. We are grateful to our community for generously supporting Samaritan this past year through the Healing Power of Progress capital campaign and for those who have chosen Samaritan to receive their healthcare. Samaritan is proud to have maintained its investment grade bond rating of BBB- from Standard & Poor’s, which is a major accomplishment for any hospital.

Samaritan Medical Center and its affiliates – Samaritan Keep Home, Samaritan Summit Village, Samaritan Medical Center Foundation, Samaritan Medical Practice and Samaritan Home Health – are staffed by 2,181 full-time equivalent employees. In 2018, payroll totaled \$143 million. As the largest private employer in the county, Samaritan is committed to the community we proudly serve. In addition to payroll costs, Samaritan expended \$99 million in 2018 to purchase goods and services necessary for the provision of care to our patients and residents.



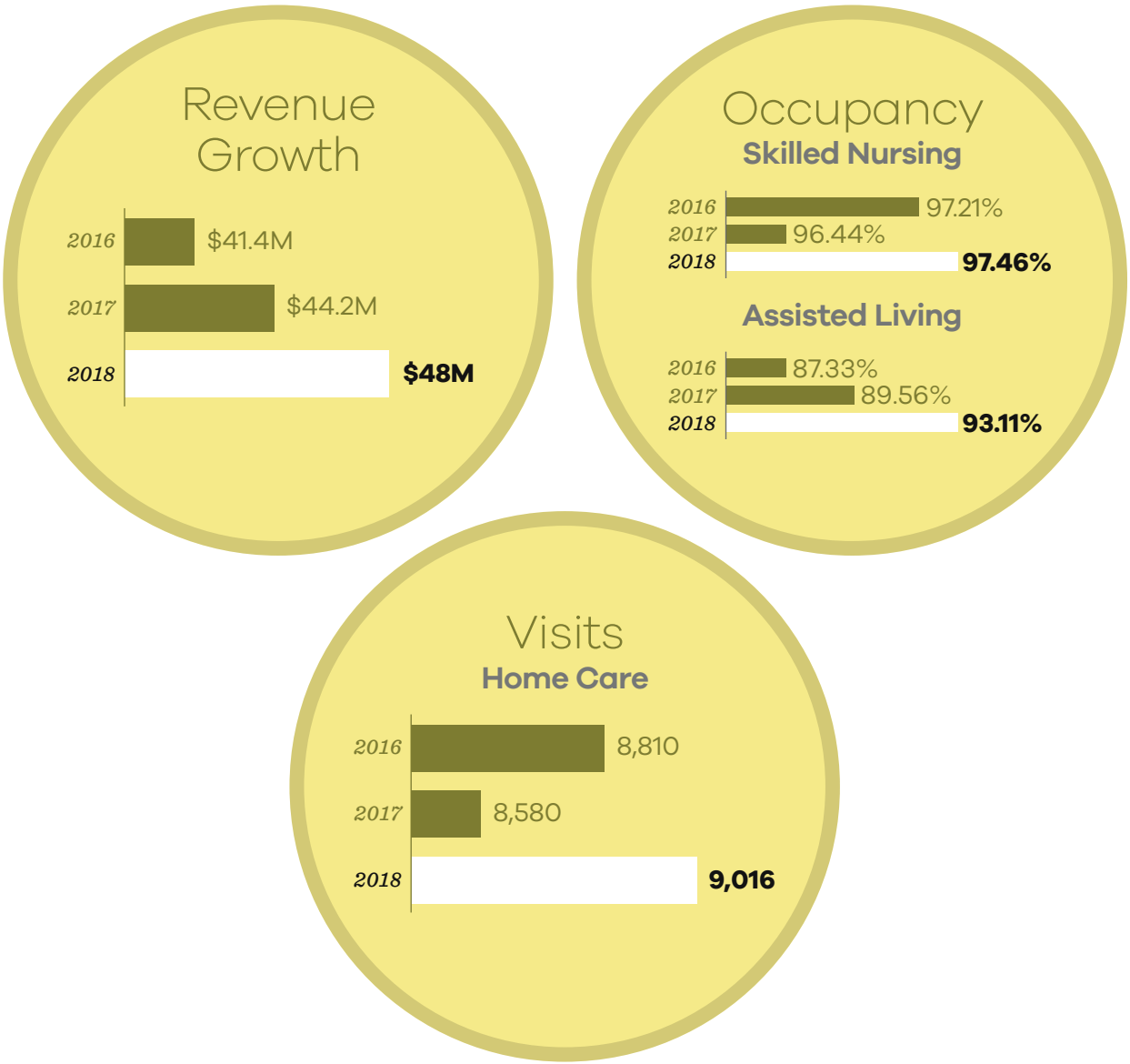
According to the Healthcare Association of New York State (HANYs), the economic activity generated by Samaritan through jobs and the purchase of goods and services is equivalent to \$395 million annually. Samaritan also is responsible for generating significant tax dollars estimated at \$44 million each year. HANYs further calculates that Samaritan’s charity care, subsidized care and services to low-income, elderly and underserved communities, coupled with investment in community health initiatives, equates to \$47 million in community benefits each year.

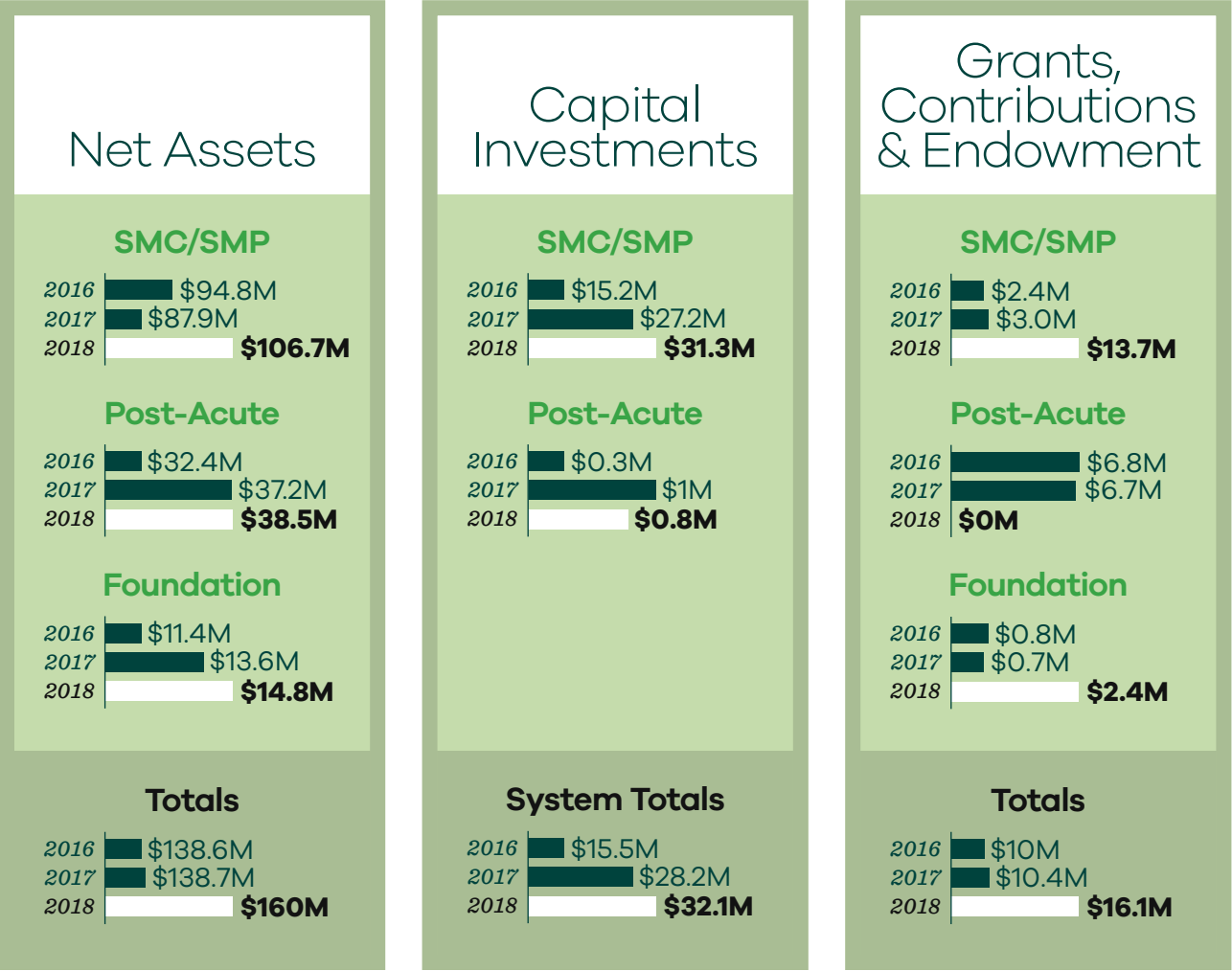

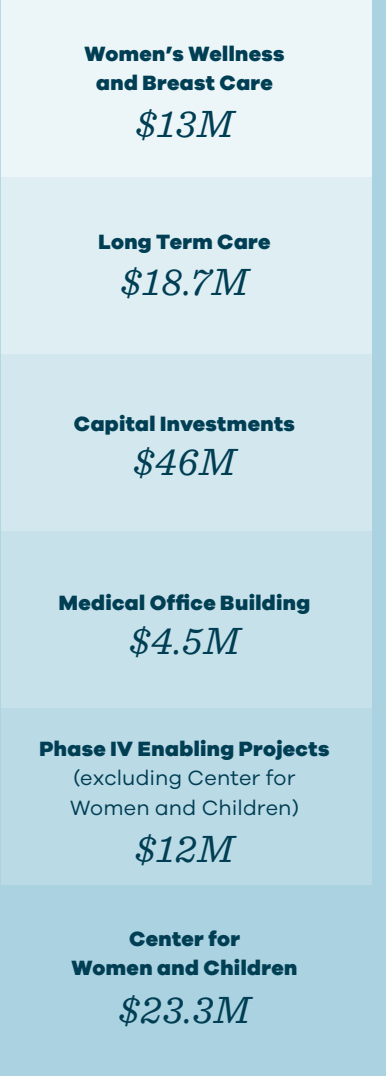


For the Future

Samaritan is committed to keeping pace with the changing technology needs and recruiting top medical staff – maintaining strong financial health is critical to allowing us to achieve our mission.



Other Current and Future Projects Include:





3-D Mammography

One of the most impactful technologies we've added to our women's wellness services is 3-D mammography. It has completely changed breast cancer screenings at Samaritan.

With 3-D mammography, doctors can get an extremely detailed scan of a woman's breast. An x-ray arm revolves around the breast, taking multiple images in a matter of seconds. The machine then uses those images to create a 3-D representation. If a tumor is present, the doctor will be able to analyze it layer by layer and from every angle, quickly and accurately.

Beyond enabling doctors to accurately assess the width and depth of a tumor, 3-D mammograms can reveal abnormalities that would have been hidden in a traditional mammogram. With 3-D mammography, we can often detect breast cancer before there are any symptoms. Plus, the procedure is more comfortable and has a far lower risk of producing a false positive.

Center for Women and Children

Our community's women and children are a top priority at Samaritan. Every year, Samaritan delivers over 1,600 babies. To better meet this growing need, we have begun construction on our new Center for Women and Children. This expansion is expected to be completed in 2020 and is dedicated to the health and well-being of the women and children of our community. The Center for Women and Children will include our labor and delivery, maternity and pediatric services all on the same floor, and will also contain the North Country's only Level II Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), providing specialized care to infants after birth with all private rooms.

Laboring mothers will be able to enter the Center for Women and Children through a dedicated entrance which will take them immediately to where they need to be. Patients will enjoy bright, spacious, mother-baby rooms. The center's Labor and Delivery Unit, which opened in September 2017, has two C-section operating rooms which accommodates both scheduled and emergency births. With an anesthesiologist on staff 24 hours a day, seven days a week, mothers will rest easy no matter the time of day they deliver. The new center's spacious rooms are large enough to accommodate family members and partners who choose to stay overnight. This large project is being constructed over several phases and is scheduled to be complete in 2022. Our Pediatric Unit is in the last phase of the project and will offer a playroom and a serenity room for patients and families. ♦



Women's Wellness *and* Breast Care

A woman's health is precious. That's why only the best will do when it comes to women's wellness services. In addition to our new Center for Women and Children, we have expanded our women's wellness services, and have started renovation and construction on our new Women's Wellness and Breast Care location – all to offer the women of our community a different level of care. The kind that relieves concerns and integrates compassion and precision perfectly. It's more than breast imaging or gynecologic services. It's both, and a lot more. Our team of obstetricians, gynecologists, surgeons, radiologists, imaging specialists, nurses and staff is ready to assist you with all your women's health care needs, utilizing the most advanced imaging services and the most leading-edge treatments. Whether you need ultrasound imaging, genetic testing or laboratory services, you will find everything you need with us. But you will also find exceptional convenience, getting your 3-D mammogram and PAP test in the same visit with fast, accurate, same-day mammography results. It's complete women's care, but it's also complete peace of mind. And in fall 2019, our women's wellness services will have a completely new home. ♦

Different from RNs, nurse practitioners are able to provide many of the same services as physicians, including developing treatment plans for their patients, ordering tests, performing minor procedures and prescribing medication.

The da Vinci Xi[®] Surgical System

Since 2012, Samaritan's Surgical Robotics team has helped patients with less-invasive, high-precision robotic surgery, specializing in urologic, general and gynecologic surgery. Samaritan's ten robotically trained surgeons have performed over 1,500 robotic-assisted surgeries since our program's inception. Just from 2016 through 2018, we saw a 45% increase in robotic surgeries. To meet the rising need for robotic surgery, we recently acquired a new surgical system that will replace our current one. The new da Vinci Xi[®] Surgical System will enhance precision as well as operating room efficiency, improving patient outcomes. The new robot is expected to be fully integrated in early March 2019. ♦



MOVE (Mobilization of Ventilated Patients Early)

On April 20, 2018, a new program went into place on Samaritan's Intensive Care Unit (ICU) called the MOVE (Mobilization of Ventilated Patients Early) program. This program is used nationally to improve outcomes, reduce length of stay and prevent complications in critically ill patients. This program was introduced to Samaritan by Dr. Rory Sears who organized nursing, therapy, pharmacy, respiratory and medicine to coordinate rounds on ICU with the goal of early mobilization. As a team, this group of professionals assesses patients for this program daily, determines who can participate medically, what safe parameters they can work under and how to help them move through recovery. As a team, they simultaneously work to get the patient moving by reducing sedative meds, managing the vent, monitoring vitals and performing therapy. We are already seeing great success and expect more to come. Many thanks to the ICU nursing team: Kim Smith, Respiratory Therapy, Pharmacy; Rachel Conley, PT, DPT; Sarah Kukesh PT, DPT; and, of course, Dr. Sears for leading Samaritan in this initiative.

Samaritan is committed to making a big difference in our community. That was the inspiration behind developing the Samaritan Experience. The Samaritan Experience is the feeling of trust and confidence our team of caregivers creates for every patient – every time. Today, all new employees are onboarded with the same expectations and are entrusted with the same responsibility: that all of us are responsible for cultivating the Samaritan Experience for our patients, residents and fellow caregivers.

In 2018, our commitment to our patients grew even stronger. Hourly rounding and bedside shift reporting were the main focuses of the inpatient units in the hospital. Hourly rounding ensures efficient and effective patient care. On the hour, the patient is rounded on by an aide or a nurse. They address the four most integral areas of patient care: pain, position, protection and potty—the 4Ps. Literature and practice have proven that when these four areas of patient care are addressed, hourly during the day and every other hour in the night, patient and staff satisfaction soar. Bedside shift report occurs when nurses change shifts. Typically at 7am and 7pm, both the outgoing and incoming nurses enter the patient's room to transfer care responsibility. Involving the patient enables the nurses to better understand his or her needs. It also ensures that the patient and their family understand the care process. This interaction helps our nursing team address concerns and questions. The combination of these two practices has achieved improved results in patient satisfaction.

Patient Experience

Our Patient Family Advisory Council (PFAC) continues to be active. The PFAC is a team of community members that meets regularly to illuminate opportunities to improve the patient experience, allowing us to gain perspectives firsthand from patients and family members.

Finally, communication boards help to round out the patient's experience at the medical center. Communication boards help patients understand what is expected from their care team, as well as what is expected from them and their families as they prepare for discharge. The board also enables caregivers to communicate vital information, such as goals, new medications and their side effects, as well as which physicians comprise their care team. The board allows patients to get a more complete picture of their care, prompting interactions that help us provide the best possible outcomes for our patients.

In 2018, our long-term care facilities continued to pave the way for better resident care in our region. With the help of Dr. LaVerne VanDeWall, Dr. Collins Kellogg, Jr. and a team from Long-Term care led by Kathy Rivers, we launched Residents for Residents. Through this program, we began working to prevent the readmission of residents who have visited the Emergency Department frequently in the past. To accomplish this, we now have a GME Resident physician on call for their care. The one-on-one attention provided through this program has proven highly successful, and the number of participants in the program has already grown. ♦



2018 Awards and Designations

The American College of Surgeons recognized Samaritan Medical Center with **The Most Meritorious Award** in the outcome areas of Mortality, Cardiac, Pneumonia, Unplanned Intubation, Ventilator > 48 hours, Renal Failure, Surgical Site Infections and Urinary Tract Infections. Samaritan achieved **Joint Commission Certification** for another three year period. Achieving accreditation and/or certification means that our staff has made an extra effort to review and improve the key areas that can affect the quality and safety of your care. Accreditation and certification by The Joint Commission are considered the gold standard in healthcare.

Samaritan's Imaging Department has recently been awarded a three-year accreditation in computed tomography (CT) scanning by the American College of Radiology (ACR). The Department's 128-slice Philips CT scanner was accredited in all four scanning categories submitted. The ACR accreditation is the gold standard by which the medical community and public can evaluate the services provided by an imaging services program.

Our Samaritan Family Health Network (SFHN) was among the first to receive **New York State Patient Centered Medical Home (PCMH) Recognition**. PCMH is a care delivery model whereby patient treatment is coordinated through their primary care physician to ensure they receive the necessary care when and where they need it, in a manner they can understand. The National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) is the accrediting body for PCMH. NCQA reached out to Samaritan to give a presentation on our PCMH journey and to encourage others to pursue NYS PCMH. Through our success with PCMH, we saw a reduction in the number of SFHN patients that utilized the emergency room,

significantly increased our screening for behavioral health indicators, and increased our patients' overall involvement in their care and wellness.

Implemented nationally recognized protocols to decrease the following hospital-acquired conditions:

- Catheter-Associated Urinary Tract Infection (UTI)
- Surgical Site Infections
- Clostridium Difficile Infections
- Central Line Associated Bloodstream Infections
- Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus Bacteremia
- Achieved national Hepatitis B birth dose honor roll status in 2018

In early 2018, the Wound Care Center Performance awards were announced and our Samaritan Wound Care Center received **Center of Distinction** for 2017 from Healogics. The center achieved outstanding clinical outcomes for twelve consecutive months on four performance indicators. ♦

The Walker Center for Cancer Care

More than 600 cancer patients are seen at Samaritan every year. And with the opening of the new Walker Center for Cancer Care, their care will be forever changed. The new Walker Center for Cancer Care provides patients with the care and compassion you would expect from your community hospital, plus a full spectrum of cutting-edge treatment options that rival the services offered at big city medical centers, including detection and screening, diagnosis, treatment, therapy and support. The new Walker Center also offers a full spectrum of follow-up services, including physical therapy, lymphedema therapy and pain management options to help our patients recover completely.

Samaritan is bringing the North Country the very best in cancer care technology. Our new linear accelerator (LINAC) has revolutionized how we use radiation to treat cancer. Delivering a concentrated beam of radiation, the LINAC tracks the patient's breathing and repositions itself to stay focused on the tumor, saving healthy tissue. The LINAC can even shorten treatment times depending on the type of cancer it is treating.

The Walker Center for Cancer Care was designed with the patient in mind, with special touches that calm as well as heal. Our new infusion suite offers chemotherapy patients a new level of treatment and comfort with comfortable reclining chemotherapy chairs—complete with entertainment systems—that face a beautiful rooftop garden. ♦

Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery

In May, 2018 a new Plastics and Reconstructive Surgery practice was established when Dr. Deana Paley joined Samaritan. Now offering our community a full spectrum of surgical services, our integrated team of specialists is here to help with everything from facial reconstruction to post-pregnancy restoration.

Pelvic Rehabilitation

Samaritan Medical Center now offers comprehensive pelvic rehabilitation through our new Pelvic Rehabilitation Program. Offering evaluation, training and treatment for patients with pelvic floor dysfunction, our new program also provides various services not commonly offered at other Northern New York physical therapy clinics.

Pelvic floor rehabilitation has proven effective in treating a wide range of conditions, including pelvic pain and incontinence. While our pelvic rehabilitation services are available to men and women, women are much more likely to experience pelvic dysfunction than men. In fact,

one in three women suffers from incontinence. Oftentimes, those same women are too embarrassed to seek treatment. What many patients don't know is that incontinence can usually be treated in just six to eight visits. Once you received a referral from your primary care provider, our team of rehabilitation specialists will provide you with the cost-effective, individualized services and treatments you need to restore your pelvic floor.

Physical therapy for pelvic rehabilitation can provide benefits to women of all ages and lifestyles. Treatments may include:

- Biofeedback
- Electrical stimulation
- Education
- Pelvic floor strengthening
- Muscle symmetry training
- Home exercise programs
- Ultrasound



Fort Drum

For over 30 years, the unique relationship between the tri-county area and our military community at Fort Drum has grown strong. Serving as a model of military-community collaboration, it's shown the true power of respect, friendship, collaboration—and community.

In 2018, a nomination was submitted for the North Country Region to be designated as a Great American Defense Community. The designation was announced in 2018 and will be awarded in 2019. This award recognizes the relationship with the community that the North Country fosters, and the transitional support that the North Country community provides military spouses and veterans alike. According to the Association of Defense Communities President Bill Parry, "The communities we recognize through the Great American Defense Community program represent the best examples of what communities can do to create great places for our military families to live and work. We congratulate the North Country region and look forward to sharing your story with the nation."

Fort Drum's annual impact on the surrounding community exceeded \$1.7 billion, creating over 5,622 jobs in the North Country. The connection between Fort Drum and the North Country has gained attention from top decision-makers within the Federal Government, the Army and the Department of Defense. Throughout 2018, Samaritan Medical Center helped showcase our healthcare model's success to numerous high-ranking officials visiting Fort Drum, including:

Samaritan hosted a visit from MEDDAC Regional staff members LTC Martin, Clinical Operations, and LTC Lee, Comptroller, as well as two officers, Major Walker and Major Mroczko. The purpose of this visit was to showcase our healthcare model.

Along with other community leaders and Fort Drum personnel, Samaritan took part in Fort Drum Day in Albany. Fort Drum Day is our day to celebrate and showcase Fort Drum's contribution to the State of New York. We met with Senator Patricia Ritchie and her colleagues, and were given the opportunity to advocate for Fort Drum with Senator Kemp Hannon and Assemblymember Richard Gottfried concerning health issues. Samaritan also met on other issues with deputy secretaries from the Governor's office, Senate and Assembly Energy Committee staff, and Senate and Assembly Higher Education staff.

In 2018, we strengthened our relationship with Fort Drum by developing a sponsorship opportunity with Fort Drum's Family Morale, Welfare, and Recreation. This relationship allows Samaritan to monetarily support the welfare of our soldiers and their families. It also enables us to provide services at events, like Baby Palooza and Mountainfest. Samaritan is proud to support these events. But most importantly, we're proud to share our many services with our military neighbors. ♦

Samaritan's Physician Graduate Medical Education (GME) Program currently offers three accredited Post Graduate Residency programs: Family Medicine, Internal Medicine and a traditional rotating internship. We are accredited by both the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) and the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME). Upon completing this program, resident physicians become eligible for Board Certification and can practice independently. Over the years, many of these resident physicians have chosen to stay after the completion of their training so they can practice medicine in the North Country. These programs are offered in conjunction with the Lake Erie Consortium for Osteopathic Medical Training. The Samaritan Physician GME Program also offers clinical rotations for third-year medical students from Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine (LECOM) and elective rotations for fourth-year students. Drawing students from across the United States, our Post Graduate Residency programs equip residents to achieve excellence in healthcare.

In April, our Graduate Medical Education program had a site visit and in October, our program attained Continued Accreditation Status from the ACGME, which affords a ten-year interval before revisit. ♦

The Clorox Healthcare Optimum-UV Enlight System

Samaritan implemented the Clorox Healthcare® Optimum-UV Enlight® System which uses ultraviolet rays to eliminate harmful microorganisms, such as C. Difficile, MRSA and VRE, that are resistant to routine cleaning methods. The Optimum-UV will provide an added infection control measure for disinfecting patient rooms and other key areas throughout Samaritan Medical Center. This will help prevent healthcare-associated infections and ensure the safest possible environment of care for our patients, staff and visitors. The Samaritan Auxiliary Center purchased one unit and Samaritan Medical Center purchased the other. ♦

The Siemens Aptio Automation System

We invested in an important lab innovation project – The Siemens Aptio Automation System was implemented as part of the lab's \$850,000 capital project. Utilizing artificial intelligence, this technology helps with turnaround times on lab testing results in a variety of different ways.

One of the keys to LEAN process improvement is the removal of non-value added (or wasted) steps in a process, and that's what the Aptio system does – and some people liken it to the "air traffic control of lab testing." By interfacing with the existing chemistry instruments throughout the lab, Aptio automatically sends specimens to the appropriate testing station for analysis, rather than the lab techs manually delivering them to each. This allows the techs to focus on the testing and not on the non-value added steps. Some examples include:

- Once blood is drawn with MobiLab, the specimen is sent to Aptio, barcode is read, timestamped, centrifuged and

transported to the appropriate instrument for analysis (all steps that were formerly manually completed by the lab techs).

- Helps to minimize interruptions. For example, if a critical value result comes up, the techs must stop their work to call the unit to alert staff of the result immediately. This means interrupting the other testing that is occurring. With Aptio, testing continues without interruption while calls are made to the units.

- If a specimen is received and tested and then the physician later orders another test on that specimen, the techs do not need to go find the specimen, Aptio does it for them.

As in the examples above and many others, this automation technology results in safer patient testing by removing manual processes and relabeling steps. By reducing those unnecessary steps, turnaround time is also reduced. The system went live at the end of October 2018. ♦
