## Dear Friends,

It feels like only a few months have passed since we shared our 2022 Year in Review with you. Although 2023 seemed to come and go in the blink of an eye, so much happened here at Samaritan. I will do my best to summarize an eventful year, but I encourage you to read on and fully appreciate all that Samaritan's Caregivers accomplished this past year.

If one theme summarizes Samaritan's efforts in 2023, and our goals for 2024, it would be "Investing in Your Health: Mind and Body." We have, since 1881, been invested in the health of our patients, but this year marked a milestone in our approach to care for mental and physical health together, comprehensively. Our community desperately needs behavioral health care resources, and the feature article of this Year in Review details a few ways in which Samaritan has begun to address this. In 2023, we began work to increase the capacity of our emergency department's behavioral health unit, applied to the state for a certificate of need to expand our inpatient mental health unit, and continued to provide exceptional outpatient behavioral health care. We recognize mental illness is often an "invisible" illness. Our goal is to push past the social stigma and advocate for enhanced mental health services to meet the community's need.

We also expanded otolaryngology services in 2023. Samaritan's Ear, Nose & Throat clinic moved up a floor in the Medical Office Building, increasing in space from 3,800 to 7,300 square feet, from nine to 11 exam rooms, and from one to three treatment rooms.

Our Home Health Agency was called a "Superior Performer" by Strategic Healthcare Programs, a national leader in health data analytics. Our contracted hospitalist group was lauded as "Program of the Year" by Apogee Physicians, the largest physician-owned hospitalist group in the nation. Two of our general surgeons performed their 500th robotic surgery. Free and secure online access to medical scans and images was made available, as was point-of-service co-payment collection at all our outpatient locations. These are amazing accomplishments, and they all occurred in 2023.

We had hardships, too, but we overcame them as a team and with the support of our community. One particularly challenging event was Watertown's water main break in October, which presented major obstacles at the hospital and caused several outpatient offices to close temporarily. So many community partners stepped in to help us, and I cannot thank them enough for their support. My biggest thanks, however, go to Samaritan's Caregivers, who rallied and communicated to ensure patients and residents were cared for safely while water was in limited supply.

Samaritan is truly fortunate to have such a dedicated team of employees, volunteers, stakeholders and supporters. This 2023 Year in Review is a testament to all we have accomplished together, and it is my pleasure to share it with you.

# A Financial Recovery Year


Samaritan Medical Center is an independent health system, which means it does not rely on affiliation with larger hospitals for financial or administrative support. This approach has become less common in today's unpredictable healthcare landscape, as many hospitals trade independence and local control for the hope of fiscal safety nets. Yet, Samaritan is committed to self-governance because it allows us to remain community-focused and nimble in the face of change. Fortunately, thanks to the determination of its board and leadership, Samaritan has remained fiscally stable through some difficult years.


Overall, 2023 was a financial recovery year for Samaritan after overcoming many challenges in 2022, such as unplanned expenses and rising workforce costs. With a solid economic recovery plan, investment in revenue-cycle management, growth of market share, and growth of services, Samaritan saw financial gain in 2023 and is poised to see more in 2024.

Investments in services such as cancer care, medical imaging, dermatology and orthopedics paid off in 2023, as patient visits increased. Samaritan expects this trend to continue across most specialties in 2024, helping to create new revenue for the system. Other legacy services, such as otolaryngology and general surgery, also grew, further supporting Samaritan's financial health. Investment in revenue-cycle staff and analytics continues to see success, resulting in fewer denials from payors and improved cash flow, which helps Samaritan to be reimbursed closer to the cost of care. This new and motivated team works hard to recoup dollars owed to the system.


Samaritan's fiscal stewardship efforts in 2023 also included innovative strategies to curb expenses. To save on essential items, such as food and medical supplies, Samaritan has continued to maximize group purchasing — buying through national group purchasing organizations and exploring other cost-saving purchasing contracts. To stabilize workforce costs, which have increased steadily in recent years, Samaritan uses productivity benchmarks to determine optimal staffing based on other hospitals of the same size. Finally, Samaritan continues to focus on reducing agency costs.

These efforts and successes indicate that our health system is recovering and stabilizing after several turbulent years. We have much to be proud of, and many hardworking Samaritan Caregivers to thank for their efforts in 2023.





Located in the Adirondack Park, where many households are far apart, Clifton-Fine Hospital not only serves as a medical center, but also as an important community hub. In 2023, after a few difficult years brought on by the pandemic, the hospital excitedly resumed this role in the community, focused on services for local families.

Clifton-Fine hosted several hospital-based farmer's markets throughout the year, bringing the community back together and providing access to healthy fruits, vegetables and other local produce. It also partnered with St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services to bring a social worker on-site two days per month, giving families increased access to services such as WIC, SNAP and HEAP. A mobile mammography van also made appearances at Clifton-Fine, thanks to a partnership with Upstate University Hospital, to ensure residents had access to breast cancer screenings.

Furthermore, when emergencies happened in the community, Clifton-Fine allowed staff who are emergency medical services (EMS) providers to leave work and respond to EMS calls. In 2023, 93 percent of calls in the Star Lake area were answered by local fire and ambulance services — many of them staffed by volunteers. Clifton-Fine is proud to have employees who save lives, both on and off the job.

Investments and advancements in hospital technology also were made in 2023. Clifton-Fine added an online scheduling platform, called Patient Connect, to its primary care clinic. This service provides patients with email and text message notifications regarding their appointments. "TalkWithYourDoc," a telemedicine platform, allows patients virtual connectivity with Clifton-Fine's healthcare providers – a crucial resource in a geographically large and sparsely populated area.

Clifton-Fine's staff benefited from improved technology, too. In 2023, the hospital deployed the VOCERA system, a network of voice-activated communication devices worn by staff. Badge readers were installed on all doors in the facility, bolstering patient and staff safety.

As 2024 begins, Clifton-Fine Hospital looks forward to new and exciting opportunities in the year ahead. It begins the year as a newly designated Rural Emergency Hospital (REH). This new classification gives small rural hospitals added federal funding, including an additional 5 percent reimbursement for covered outpatient services and monthly facilities payments.

In spring 2024, ground will be broken on the hospital's 9,600-square-foot emergency department expansion and renovation. This project will double the beds available for emergency department patients and add advanced air-filtration and infection control measures, a trauma room and isolation rooms, a dedicated ambulance bay, and more.

With the largest home health consumer assessment benchmark in the nation, SHP is in a unique position to identify and recognize organizations that have made patient satisfaction a priority.

"SHP is very excited to have the opportunity to recognize the hard work and dedication of our top-performing customers with the annual SHPBest awards," said SHP President Kevin Vogel. "We commend these organizations for their determination to provide top-notch care to the patients and caregivers that they serve."

Samaritan Home Health employs 24 caregivers and serves an average of 160 patients per day.

"We are proud to receive this award as it is a true representation of the patient's perspective on the high-quality level of personalized care we offer," said Stephanie Parks, director of patient services at Samaritan Home Health.

#### Kim Filkins, Samaritan Home Health Grateful Patient

As a retired nurse, Kim knew she needed help when she began feeling short of breath during her daily routine. Her heartbeat raced and was irregular, and she barely made it to the office of Samaritan Pulmonologist Dr. David Rechlin.

"He saw my pulse oximetry was in the fifties, which is basically incompatible with life, and my heart was racing, and he told me, 'You're going in an ambulance right now to the hospital."

In the Samaritan Emergency Department, Kim was diagnosed with atrial fibrillation — a rapid, irregular heartbeat — and given medication to stabilize it. She was referred for follow-up care from Samaritan Home Health, to help her manage chronic conditions in the comfort of her home.

"Tll tell you, it's the best thing that's ever happened," Kim said. "Somebody called me within days after I got home from the hospital and set up all these appointments with these different people, so I was busy four days a week with everybody that came in to help make my recovery safe. If they noticed something abnormal, they would find out what's going on and intervene from there."

Even better, Kim said, her stamina has improved and she is able to do more things that make her happy and keep her active.

# **Emergency Preparedness Drill**





In July, Samaritan Medical Center participated in a drill with Fort Drum to practice the hospital's emergency management policies and protocols.

The drill consisted of a fake active-shooter incident on the Army installation, which resulted in a fake mass-casualty situation.

The Incident Command Team at Samaritan Medical Center called a CODE99 disaster drill and simulated a lockdown at the hospital. A Mass Casualty Incident Policy was enacted, and the team set up a triage area in the ambulance bay. Triage zones were established for patient acuity, and the Incident Command System identified potential needs to handle the influx of

At least 15 mock patients were transported to Samaritan by ambulances and Black Hawk helicopters. Many of these mock patients were posed as needing surgical intervention, so Samaritan could practice how it would handle this situation with a full operating room.

Overall, the exercise went very well. These drills create lots of healthy dialogue and strategies for improvement to our emergency preparedness plan.

#### Welcome new MEDDAC Commander

Since there is no hospital on Fort Drum, Samaritan Medical Center is one of the major healthcare options for Fort Drum personnel and their family members. Samaritan takes great pride in this role, and we continue to strengthen our relationship with Fort Drum and serve as a nationwide model for integrated militarycivilian health care

We were fortunate to have worked with Col. Matthew Mapes, who served as the commander of MEDDAC Fort Drum. Upon Col. Mapes's exit, we welcomed Col.  $Christina\ Buchner\ as\ commander\ of\ MEDDAC\ Fort\ Drum\ in\ July.\ Throughout\ the$ remainder of 2023, we learned much from Col. Buchner and continue collaborating to provide quality health care to our nation's service members and their families.

# First Lady Dr. Jill Biden's Visit

On January 30, 2023, First Lady Dr. Jill Biden and Deputy Defense Secretary Dr. Kathleen Hicks visited Fort Drum as part of the Joining Forces Initiative. Samaritan Medical Center President and CEO Tom Carman was one of five community members selected to attend, as a key representative of the largest private employer in Jefferson County.

Also in attendance were 10th Mountain Division Commanding General Maj. Gen. Gregory K. Anderson, Garrison Commander Col. Matthew R. Myer, Command Sgt. Maj. Nema Mobarakzadeh, Command Sgt. Maj. Jeremiah J. Larson, and their spouses.

Dr. O'Brien delivered my son after 29 hours of labor, and seeing her at the end of my delivery brought me immediate relief because I knew I was in good hands. Thank you for being a provider who cares genuinely for your patients."

# Music lover. Cancer survivor.

Karen Ernest is a music lover, a retired paramedic, and a cancer survivor.

In April 2022, after 19 years of normal mammograms, her routine mammogram came back with an anomaly, which was later determined to be Stage 3 highly aggressive breast cancer. She was shocked — no other woman in her family had received such a diagnosis.

"When I initially received my diagnosis of having breast cancer, I had no idea where I was going to go for my care," she said. "Most people go south to Syracuse or west to Rochester or Buffalo, but the team at Samaritan is fully capable of treating any and every patient for their cancer problems. They had all the resources that I needed, right here in the town that I live in, saving me from long trips to other cities that were unnecessary."

After enduring high-dose chemotherapy and a lumpectomy, she is cancer free.



## Samaritan Unveils Expanded **Ear, Nose & Throat Specialty Clinic**

In early May 2023, Samaritan Medical Center unveiled its expanded Ear, Nose & Throat (ENT) specialty clinic with an open house and ribbon-cutting event. The clinic, previously located on the second floor of the Samaritan Medical Office Building, 826 Washington St., moved to a larger space on the third floor, where it has been seeing patients since May eighth. The new location increases ENT's clinic space from 3,800 to 7,300 square feet, from nine to 11 exam rooms, and from one to three treatment rooms. It also will allow the clinic to continue to grow and recruit new physicians.

Samaritan ENT cares for nearly 10,000 patients a year. ENT specialists diagnose, manage and treat diseases and disorders of the ears, nose, throat and related structures of the head and neck, including the sinuses, larynx (voice box), oral cavity and upper pharynx (mouth and throat).

Samaritan is now St. Lawrence Radiology's largest client, and the partnership has been beneficial to all, especially Samaritan patients. Imaging read times have improved, and Samaritan is less reliant on after-hours radiology services.

She supports the Samaritan Graduate Medical Education's residency program as a faculty supervisor. She served as Emergency Department Chair from 2002-08 and has been a member of multiple hospital committees, including the Credentials and Medical Executive Committees

Dr. Lundborg-Gray has served as Emergency Department Medical Director since 2011.

# Emergency Nurse Residency Program

Staffing an emergency department that cares for upwards of 35,000 patients a year is a challenge, especially in the wake of COVID-19, which caused many clinicians to retire early or become traveling nurses. Fortunately, a new program at Samaritan that trains nurses for the emergency department (ED) is showing early signs of success.

Samaritan's Emergency Nurse Residency Program, launched in 2022, brings new graduate nurses into the hospital for a year of hands-on training and mentorship. Nurses in the program spend six months rotating through different critical care areas of the hospital, including the medical/surgical floors, labor and delivery, pediatrics, and behavioral health. They then spend another six months acclimating to the daily assignments and responsibilities in the ED. This curriculum provides nurses with well-rounded knowledge and broad skill sets as they begin their careers.

In September 2023, the program celebrated its first graduate — Sarah Wallace, RN, who previously worked at Samaritan as a patient care assistant. She now works full time as an RN in the ED.

"I believe that this program is a great program to help new nurses explore emergency medicine while encompassing other departments," Sarah said. "This aids in strengthening the community within Samaritan by having the residents go on rotations to each floor."

Two additional nurses graduated in January 2024, one more graduated in March 2024, and all others are expected to follow suit before the end of 2024.

Samaritan continues to recruit graduate nurses, or nurses who will soon graduate, for the Emergency Nurse Residency Program, with a goal of sustaining 12 resident nurses per year. New nurses to Samaritan may be eligible for a variety of sign-on bonuses and benefits, including loan and relocation assistance



# Stefanik Support to GME Program

Samaritan's Graduate Medical Education program benefited from continued advocacy efforts by U.S. Representative Elise Stefanik in 2023. The congresswoman and her staff helped Samaritan receive additional Medicare-funded physician residency slots, effective July 1.

To offset some of the costs associated with on-the-job training of medical residents, Medicare pays teaching hospitals, such as Samaritan Medical Center, to train a certain number of residents each year. However, due to a Medicare administrative oversight years ago, Samaritan incorrectly lost part of this subsidy, equivalent to 2.71 resident slots. Those lost dollars have been restored, thanks to Rep. Stefanik's advocacy, which began in October 2021.

At a rural hospital such as Samaritan, the ability to train more residents cost-effectively is a significant asset, as these residents may decide to stay in the North Country to practice medicine. This translates to greater quality of care for local patients and fewer dollars spent on recruitment and retention.

"The importance of Medicare-funded residency slots to us here in Watertown and across the North Country cannot be understated," Samaritan President and CEO Thomas Carman said. "Congresswoman Stefanik's successful efforts advocating to increase the number of Medicare-funded physician residency slots at Samaritan, in spite of CMS's previous administrative mistake, are further evidence of her commitment to strengthen rural health care, and we thank her for her continued work on this issue."

# Quality and Safety

With hundreds of thousands of patient encounters a year, more than 2,000 dedicated caregivers, and dozens of medical specialties and clinic locations, the Samaritan Health System is a complex and intricate care network. What keeps it all operating smoothly and consistently? Complete dedication to the quality and safety of patient and resident care.

In 2023, Samaritan blended cutting-edge technology with compassion in pursuit of zero patient harm and continuous improvement for its patients and residents. Here are a few of the past year's quality and safety achievements.

# Advanced Technology

The Intensive Care Unit (ICU) at Samaritan Medical Center implemented the Starling Fluid Management Monitoring System, a device that delivers accurate and precise data about a patient's fluid responsiveness. Historically, when a patient being treated with IV fluid was not responding to the treatment, more drastic measures — such as a central venous catheter or vasopressors — have been required. The Starling system helps reduce these occurrences by providing clinicians with real-time data needed to decide if the patient would benefit from additional fluid. This helps reduce the risks of infection, air embolism and pneumothorax that come with central lines. It also can reduce the length and cost of a patient's hospital stay. A live education event on the Starling system was held in December for Samaritan's ICU nurses.

Samaritan Imaging Services upgraded its cardiac ultrasound machine to the latest Philips EPIQ model. The new equipment greatly improves diagnostics for cardiac patient care, with 3D imaging capabilities, vastly improved image quality, and myocardial strain imaging — an important assessment tool (especially for chemotherapy and heart failure patients) that evaluates the function of the heart muscle and allows for early detection of heart failure.

Samaritan's Laboratory added two new instruments to its Microbiology Department, which increased capacity for COVID-19 and respiratory testing panels. This translates to faster results for patients and providers. The laboratory also upgraded two coagulation instruments in August. Technologists use these machines to test blood samples for conditions that cause excessive clotting or bleeding, such as liver disease, thrombophilia and hemophilia. Coagulation tests are helpful to monitor patients taking medications that affect clotting, and are sometimes needed before a surgery.

#### Survey Successes

The Joint Commission, Samaritan Medical Center's accrediting agency, conducted an unannounced triennial accreditation survey of the hospital in early October. The survey went extremely well, and Samaritan's Facilities Team in particular was highlighted for its efforts to ensure fire safety throughout the hospital campus. Some minor citations were received; however, all were below "conditional"



level," which means Samaritan is required only to show evidence of compliance, and that no further unannounced survey is required. Citations of this nature are common in hospitals and are not considered by The Joint Commission as harmful to patient safety.

The Joint Commission also conducted its biennial laboratory survey in July. The surveyors spent time in the lab and on the nursing units for patient tracking purposes. Overall, the survey went very well. Surveyors were especially impressed by Samaritan's daily safety call, which occurs each day at 8 a.m. and allows managers from each department to identify any safety concerns for the day, or report successes since the last call.

Additional surveys of Samaritan's Laboratory were conducted in August and November by the NYS Department of Health and The Association for the Advancement of Blood & Biotherapies (AABB), respectively. Both surveys produced positive results for Samaritan, with only a few minor documentation-related citations.

# **Awards and Designations for Quality and Safety**

# Excellus BlueCross BlueShield Health and Wellness Award

In May, Samaritan Medical Center received an **Excellus BlueCross BlueShield Health and Wellness Award** in the amount of \$9,942.81 for its Cancer Pathology Quality Improvement program. Funds will purchase a new compound microscope and a C-mount camera port, devices that will improve prognosis time and alleviate the need for follow-up biopsies. With this lab equipment upgrade, Samaritan will be able to improve the quality of care for 120 cancer patients annually.

In November, Samaritan was one of 31 upstate New York hospitals and health centers to receive a combined \$28 million in quality improvement payments from Excellus BlueCross BlueShield. Funds are awarded only to facilities that meet goals in the following areas:

- Clinical Processes of Care efforts to improve follow-up care after hospitalization; quality measures related to diabetes, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), and surgical care; and other quality improvement measures unique to each participating hospital.
- Patient Safety efforts to reduce hospital-acquired infections, readmissions, and other adverse events or errors that affect patient care.
- Patient Satisfaction high performance on the Hospital Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (HCAHPS) survey, which is a national, standardized, publicly reported survey of patients' perspectives of hospital care.

# National Injury Prevention Day

In its effort to become a Level III Trauma Center, Samaritan Medical Center collaborated with the City of Watertown to proclaim November 18, 2023, as "National Injury Prevention Day." Surgeons from Samaritan General Surgery spearheaded the initiative, which raised awareness about preventable injury and recognized Samaritan's commitment to promote safety throughout the year.

# Advanced Primary Stroke Center Designation

Samaritan Medical Center was recertified as an Advanced Primary Stroke Center by The Joint Commission for a fourth consecutive year. This certification recognizes healthcare organizations that provide clinical programs across the continuum of stroke care. The certification evaluates how organizations use clinical outcomes and performance measures to identify opportunities to improve care and educate and prepare patients and their caregivers for discharge.

# Blue Distinction® Centers+ for Maternity Care

Samaritan Medical Center maintained its designation as a Blue Distinction® Centers+ for Maternity Care, a recognition awarded by Excellus BlueCross BlueShield to facilities that demonstrate expertise and a commitment to quality care for vaginal and cesarean section deliveries. Blue Distinction Centers demonstrate better overall patient satisfaction and a lower percentage of early elective deliveries.

# **Chronic Care Management Expansion**

In 2023, chronic care management coordination services became available to Samaritan Family Health practitioners as an additional support to offer their patients. Chronic care coordination is performed by a team of two registered nurses and two non-clinical staff members. It seeks to help patients who have conditions such as diabetes, COPD, depression and heart disease.

Providers can refer patients whom they believe would benefit from the service, and chronic care professionals will connect with patients between doctor visits to be sure they are doing well. This allows for troubleshooting and helps prevent hospitalizations among patients who may otherwise wait too long to seek provider assistance.

#### Powershare

In April, Samaritan launched "Powershare," an online service that makes medical imaging and radiology scans and reports easily accessible to patients and providers. This free, secure and convenient service reduces the need for patients and providers to request paper copies or discs, reducing traffic to Samaritan's Medical Records Department, which is visited by more than 500 patients every month.

# Dr. Wilson and Boston Scientific Urology Webinar

In August, Samaritan Urologist Dr. Deborah Wilson hosted a "Pelvic Organ Prolapse and Stress Urinary Incontinence" webinar in collaboration with Boston Scientific

Ahead of the webinar, Dr. Wilson was featured on the "Morning Checkup" segment of WWNY-TV 7 News to explain incontinence and prolapse, as well as who the webinar would benefit and why education is important. Twentynine people registered for the webinar.

# Behavioral Health

Ask a roomful of Americans about the state of mental health in the United States, and you will almost have a consensus — 9 out of 10 U.S. adults believe our country is facing a "mental health crisis."

Sadly, data from both national and local sources seem to reinforce this notion. In a series of Pew Research Center surveys<sup>2</sup> conducted between 2020 and 2022, a staggering 41% of adults reported feeling "high levels of psychological distress" within the past few years. A similar Pew study revealed that, in 2021, 44% of high school students "felt sad or hopeless almost every day for two or more weeks in a row." Here in the North Country, adult residents of Jefferson, Lewis and St. Lawrence counties have expressed<sup>3</sup> waning optimism about their mental health for several consecutive years. In 2023, just 48% of adults rated their personal mental health as "Excellent or Very Good," a significant decrease from 60% of adults in 2018.

What has caused, or is causing, this startling trend may take years to fully understand. Fortunately, Samaritan Medical Center is not waiting years to take action. In 2023, we made great strides to improve and expand our mental and behavioral health services, because we know our community needs us.



#### ${\bf Expanding\,the\,Behavioral\,Health\,Unit}$

In September, Samaritan announced a \$2.5 million renovation to its emergency department that will expand the behavioral health unit (BHU) and provide enhanced care for psychiatric patients. When completed in summer 2024, the new 12-bed secure unit will more than double the capacity of the current five-bed BHU to better meet the needs of the community. As the average daily census of psychiatric patients continues to increase — it was approximately eight patients in 2023, with a high of over 20 at one time — this expansion becomes ever more necessary.

Currently, when the BHU exceeds its normal and overflow capacities, psychiatric patients are assigned to medical beds within the emergency department. This has two immediate impacts — first, there are fewer beds to treat medical patients, and second, more staff members are needed to watch psychiatric patients, because of the inherent safety risks in a traditional medical room. If this happens when the emergency department is already short on medical rooms, it can lead to diversion, a status in which Samaritan's Emergency Department must temporarily reroute incoming ambulances to other hospitals because it cannot safely accommodate new patients. Activating diversion puts stress on our local emergency medical services personnel, our community members, and the entire Samaritan Health System.

Dedicating more space to the BHU, as Samaritan is doing with this construction project, will lessen the frequency and intensity of these scenarios. That's why, even though this project was not budgeted for 2023, it was made a priority to ensure patient safety. By the end of 2023, more than \$745,000 was committed by the Samaritan Foundation, Children's Miracle Network of NNY and Jefferson County Community Services, and Samaritan continues to look for grant funds to offset project costs.

Construction began in summer 2023 and will continue in phases to limit the

interruption of current emergency department operations. Space for the new BHU will be gained by relocating the Samaritan Auxiliary coffee shop to a different area of the main lobby, and by optimizing physician office and existing hallway space. We anticipate the new BHU space will be open by June 2024.

#### Looking to the Future

With the mental health of our community at stake, Samaritan will not stop with the expansion of its emergency department behavioral health unit. It also plans to add beds to the adult inpatient mental health unit (IMHU). In 2023, the hospital submitted an application to the New York State Office of Mental Health to increase the IMHU's capacity from 34 to 39 beds. This expansion is needed, since the IMHU is consistently at full capacity. Roughly 50% of the adults who arrive at the emergency department for a mental health crisis are admitted to Samaritan's IMHU for stabilization and a treatment plan, and the average stay in the IMHU is seven to 10 days. If approved, this expansion project will cost approximately \$1 million.

#### **Outpatient Care**

In addition to these expansion projects, Samaritan continues to offer comprehensive outpatient mental health and addiction services at the Samaritan Health & Wellness Plaza, 1575 Washington St., Watertown. Our outpatient behavioral health therapists provide individual, couples, and family counseling, sexual abuse counseling, play therapy and additional services.

Samaritan Medical Center has been dedicated to the health of the North Country since 1881, and it is now more invested than ever in the health of our patients' bodies and minds. By expanding needed services, continuing to provide compassionate, high-quality care, and working together as a community, we will overcome the mental health crisis we find ourselves in.

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# Caregiver Experience

Everyone who works at Samaritan has an impact on the care and experience of our patients. Some provide direct medical treatment while others provide indirect care, such as making a patient's meals, washing their bed linens, or offering a warm welcome as they enter our facilities. No matter what role we play, we are all Samaritan Caregivers.

Recognizing this, Samaritan remains firmly committed to the happiness, growth and development of its employees. In addition to offering competitive wages, top-tier benefits and other incentives, Samaritan invests in the continuing education of its staff through several scholarship opportunities. Here are a few employee investment highlights from 2023:

#### Practical Nurse Community Sponsorship Program:

In 2023, Samaritan began a partnership with Jefferson-Lewis BOCES to offer financial sponsorships to nurses who wish to further their careers. Through this new Practical Nurse Community Sponsorship Program, Samaritan provides up to \$10,000 of support per student to help cover the costs of a 10-month practical nursing program offered at BOCES. In exchange, graduating licensed practical nurses (LPNs) make a 2- or 3-year work commitment to Samaritan. This sponsorship program is open to all community members and can help with other expenses beyond tuition.

#### Susan Peters Nursing Scholarships:

For the sixth consecutive year, the Samaritan Foundation awarded Susan Peters Nursing Scholarships to two employees: Maegan Castle, RN, Intensive Care Unit; and Joseph Donoghue, RN, Emergency Department.

Both nurses are working toward their Family Nurse Practitioner certification. The Susan Peters Nursing Scholarship was established in 2018 to assist with the education costs for RNs who are continuing their education, specifically to pursue nurse practitioner degrees. Two scholarships of \$2,000 are awarded each year.

#### Mother Cabrini Scholarships:

With the help of the Iroquois Healthcare Association's Workforce Investment Organization Scholar's program, Samaritan awarded three 2023 Mother Cabrini Scholarships to staff members advancing their studies. Receiving \$2,972.85 scholarships for tuition, books, and other supplies were: Lacy McKellip, a unit assistant attending Jefferson Community College's RN program; Michaela Kline, a unit assistant enrolled in SUNY Canton's LPN program; and Thelma Mathison, an LPN in the RN program at St. Joseph's College of Nursing. All three recipients work in Samaritan's Obstetrics Department, a unit in which many employees look to grow and develop their careers. Mother Cabrini Scholarships help Samaritan employees pursuing certifications as LPNs, RNs, respiratory therapists, lab technicians or medical technicians.

## **Robotic Surgery Celebrations**

for 500 Cases

Dr. Eduardo Barayuga and Dr. Daniel Bryden reached a robotic surgery milestone in 2023, surpassing 500 procedures each on the da Vinci Surgical System. The occasions were marked by celebrations with the surgical services team.

"It's humbling that this has happened," Dr. Barayuga said. "One thing about our program that I'm especially proud of is that we are doing robotic surgery even in emergency cases. We are able to do it 24/1"

The da Vinci robot has assisted surgeons with more than 3,700 procedures since it was introduced at Samaritan Medical Center in 2012. In addition to general surgery operations such as gall bladder removals, hernia repairs, and colon and antireflux surgeries, the da Vinci system is used in gynecologic and urologic surgeries.

#### **Apogee Hospitalist Program**

Samaritan's contracted hospitalist group, Apogee Physicians, was awarded "Program of the Year" by Apogee in 2023.

Apogee is the largest hospitalist group in the nation. It hosts a Program Director Summit each year, bringing together members from around the country to celebrate the best of the best in hospital medicine.

To achieve this award, the local team, led by Dr. Asim Kichloo and in collaboration with hospital leadership, must be aligned on multiple aspects in the delivery of patient care. All programs are evaluated on their performance in key quality metrics, such as hospital readmissions, length of hospital stay, patient health metrics, team staffing, recruiting, retention, and collaboration with hospital drivers of quality.

# Samaritan Auxiliary

Established in 1896, the Samaritan Auxiliary is a 501(c)(3) organization, governed by a board of directors and consisting of volunteers who continue its mission. The Auxiliary is entering its 128th year of service, raising money to purchase capital equipment for Samaritan Medical Center and Samaritan's clinics. It also fulfills smaller requests from units, such as stuffed animals for children receiving care in Samaritan's surgical services, providing patients with Watertown Daily Times newspapers, and supplying behavioral health unit patents with coloring books, crayons, crossword puzzles and more. Auxiliary volunteers work in the Samaritan Medical Center and Samaritan Summit Village gift shops, providing hours of dedicated service to help us achieve these goals. Volunteers also assist with several uniform and purse sales throughout the year.

The 2023 One Night, One Diamond event – Samaritan Auxiliary's only community fundraising event — was held in March at The Peak (formerly The Commons) on Fort Drum. It was well attended and an incredible success after two years of virtual events. The event was made possible by the very gracious generosity of the community — many sponsors and donors supported the event, allowing the Auxiliary to raise \$87,661 for Samaritan. These funds purchased BioFire modules for Samaritan's laboratory, offering an increased capacity to process respiratory tests, blood culture work-ups and gastrointestinal panels. Funds also supported the purchase of a Hologic Breast PACS System, which allows mammograms, breast ultrasounds and breast MRIs to be read in less time. This state-of-the-art technology aligns with Samaritan Auxiliary's mission of enhancing health care at Samaritan and purchasing it would not have been possible without the community's support.

Thank you to Irene Carman for her 18 years of dedication and commitment to Samaritan Auxiliary's One Night, One Diamond.

In May, the Samaritan Auxiliary awarded two scholarships to Samaritan Caregivers who are working to further their education. One \$1,500 scholarship was awarded to Anna O'Neil, an RN in the progressive care unit (PCU), to assist with her Bachelor of Science in Nursing studies at Chamberlain University. Anna expects to complete the program in 2025. Since the receipt of the scholarship, Anna was promoted to assistant nurse manager of the intensive care and progressive care units in 2023.

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

A committee reviews applications and votes to award grants based upon eligibility. In 2023, the program assisted 82 patients with grants totaling \$53,500.

The Susan K. Peters Nursing Scholarship was established in 2018 with the aim of providing financial assistance for registered nurses (RNs) pursuing further education, specifically to obtain a nurse practitioner degree. Each year, two scholarships of \$2,000 are awarded.

# 2022-24 Community Health Assessment (CHA) and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

#### - a New York State Prevention Agenda Initiative

Jefferson County Public Health Service, Carthage Area Hospital, River Hospital and Samaritan Medical Center met throughout 2023 to continue assessing the county's 2022-24 priority health areas. Meetings focused on goal progress, annual reporting, and updating the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) to collect and assess data focused on countywide health care goals. Goals and interventions are chosen to align with the New York State Prevention Agenda, the Community Guide (Community Preventive Services Task Force), and rely upon databases of evidence-based programs and practices created by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

#### Summary of Community Health Assessment (CHA) Findings:

- High Rates of Chronic Diseases and Tobacco Use: The assessment revealed a significant prevalence of chronic diseases in the county, with tobacco use being a major contributing factor. This finding was supported by data indicating a high rate of cigarette and electronic nicotine delivery systems use among residents.
- Mental Health and Substance Use Concerns: There was a notable concern regarding mental health and substance use disorders, especially among youth. The data showed alarming rates of suicidal ideation, planning and attempts among youth, as well as rising rates of substance use as youth advance through grade levels.
- Disparities in Health Outcomes: The assessment identified disparities in health outcomes based on age and socioeconomic status. These disparities were particularly evident in chronic disease prevalence and mental health issues.
- Community Health Survey Insights: The Community Health Survey of Adult Residents provided critical insights, highlighting increases in chronic conditions such as high blood pressure, obesity, diabetes and heart disease. It also shed light on the community's perception of mental health services and the need for better access.

These findings underscored the need for targeted interventions in the areas of chronic disease prevention, tobacco cessation, mental health, and substance use disorder prevention. The chosen prevention measures aim to address these key areas by implementing evidence-based strategies that are tailored to the specific needs and challenges of Jefferson County's population.

# Power of Grants

In 2023, Samaritan Medical Center received \$779,960 in approved grant funding. Highlighted projects include:

- Northern New York Community Foundation COVID Relief Funding: This funding supports the establishment of a nursing scholarship fund, nurse recruitment and clinical educator costs.
- Excellus Health and Wellness Grant: This grant supported the purchase of a compound microscope and a C-mount camera port that will directly improve quality of care for cancer patients by reducing prognosis time and alleviating the need for follow-up biopsies.
- Office of Mental Health, Community Mental Health Professional Loan Repayment Program: This funding is used on retention efforts for mental health providers and professionals.
- Saint Agatha Foundation: Funds support the Circle of Hope program for breast cancer patients at Samaritan Medical Center.
- Stewart's Shops: This funding supported the purchase of four iPads for the emergency department behavioral health unit for patient use.

In addition to the new grants received, Samaritan continued to steward current grant contracts, bringing in an additional \$164,240 in contracted funding agreements. Existing projects include:

- Department of Criminal Justice Services, Sexual Assault Nursing Examiner (SANE): The emergency department continued to make equipment purchases and train nurses while Samaritan works toward becoming a SANE-accredited hospital. This is a five-year grant, and 2023 was the third year.
- Rural Health Care Access Development Program: Funds from this contract were used in 2023 for the purchase of the Hologic Secureview System in the radiology department. Samaritan is in the fourth year of a five-year grant contract.



# The 26th Annual **Thousand Islands Golf Classic**

The 26th annual Thousand Islands Golf Classic was held June 9 at the Thousand Islands Country Club on Wellesley Island. This year's dinner and silent and live auctions were held at the Edgewood Resort on June 8. The event successfully netted \$127,033, with 53 teams playing and more than 225 attendees at the dinner and auctions. Half of the funds raised from this year's event have been allocated to support the expansion of Samaritan's Emergency Department Behavioral Health Unit from five to 12 secure rooms, and to expand the inpatient mental health unit from 34 to 39 rooms.



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# The 21st Annual North Country Festival of Trees

A North Country Festival of Trees was held November 24 through December 3 and welcomed a record number of attendees. More than 250 people attended this year's gala and live auction, marking a remarkable start to the holiday season. 
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

Waking up to chest pain on a Monday morning,
Don checked in with his physician and received a referral for an ultrasound at the end of the week. By Thursday, his pain had intensified, and he decided to come to Samaritan.



"I came to Samaritan and got into the ER very quickly, about 10 minutes," Don said. "From there, they did several tests and admitted me with pneumonia in my right lung."

Don spent more than five days in the hospital, letting fluid drain from his lungs. He was impressed by the attentiveness and kindness of his Samaritan Caregivers.

"I didn't know what to expect when I came here," he said. "Tve heard some good and I've heard some bad, but to be honest I had the best treatment I could expect coming to this facility. I just wanted to thank the nurses, thank the doctors, and thank all the staff for the job that they did, and make sure that the administration knows that they're doing a great job. I would recommend anybody come here and be treated."

#### Joshua Dietterich

Joshua came to Samaritan's Emergency Department after weeks of irregular heartbeat. At just 32 years old, he was concerned for his life. Luckily, his anxiety was short-lived.

"I sat down, filled out paperwork, and they had me in within five to 10 minutes," he said. "All at once, there were at least four people volunteering to take care of me. They were all polite and made the process really easy."

After a couple of hours, tests performed by emergency department staff showed that his condition was not an immediate risk, and he was sent home with a plan to see a cardiologist. Samaritan Caregivers assured him he was going to be okay.

"I would definitely recommend Samaritan," Joshua said. "They took care of me. I was in and out within a couple of hours, and I was treated with the utmost respect and professionalism by all staff throughout my experience."



# Meet Our 2023 Champion: Sammy Shelton

Samuel Allen "Sammy" Shelton of Watertown was born February 12, 2018, and was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia when he was just 7 months old.

He spent the following six months as a patient at Upstate Golisano Children's Hospital in Syracuse. On April 2, 2019, he rang the cancer-free bell, signifying the end of treatment, and was able to return home. The leukemia returned just a month later, and Sammy's doctors recommended a life-saving bone marrow transplant.

Finding a bone marrow match is much more difficult than matching blood types. Sammy's immediate family members were tested, but no match was found. When the search was expanded, a 100% match was found from a donor registry in Germany. A small package of cells traveled with a courier all the way to Rochester on September 24, 2019, and the doctors were ready to complete the procedure. Two months later, the family was told the transplant was a success and Sammy was finally able to go home.

Sammy has been cancer-free since then, but he continues to deal with side effects from chemotherapy and other treatments, which have taken a toll on his little body. He has a gastronomy tube in his stomach to aid in eating and administering his multiple medications. He also has neurological issues, neuropathy and receives several different therapies. Many specialists still monitor his condition very carefully.

Despite all he has been through, Sammy is a happy, fun-loving boy who loves to play with dinosaurs and ride his tricycle. He and his brothers are homeschooled by their mom, and he especially enjoys learning the alphabet, writing his name and reading books. The doctors all say he is a "miracle baby," and his family certainly agrees. Sammy is a little fighter who loves everyone and continues to be "Sammy Strong."

# Infant Abduction Security System

As part of Children's Miracle Network's effort to ensure that Samaritan's youngest patients receive the best care possible, \$222,659 was used in 2023 to upgrade specialized equipment in child-centered areas at Samaritan and to provide enhanced care for pediatric patients. An additional \$214,000 was allocated to purchase and install a new infant abduction security system, which was a high priority for Samaritan's Car-Freshner Center for Women & Children. CMN also has contributed \$300,000 toward the expansion of the behavioral health unit in Samaritan's Emergency Department, which will increase the capacity to treat patients and provide a safer, child-friendly area.

# By the Numbers: Children's Miracle Network of NNY

Samaritan Medical Center has been the North Country's Children's Miracle Network (CMN) Hospital since 1990, using donated funds to improve the health and well-being of children in Jefferson, Lewis and St. Lawrence counties.

In 2023, Children's Miracle Network raised \$453,610 to administer programs that support local kids. CMN's Direct Family Assistance Program disbursed \$80,431 to local families with children facing medical crises, helping to reimburse their out-of-pocket expenses for travel, co-pays and equipment. A total of 40 children received this financial support in 2023.

# Radiothon

The annual Community Broadcasters CMN Radiothon celebrated its 23rd year in November, bringing local CMN stories to North Country radio listeners. During the three-day broadcast on The Border 106.7 and 94 Rock, listeners offered generous donations to help sick and injured children. Many CMN families and their children shared their courageous and heartwarming stories, and reminded everyone that donations stay local and truly have a big impact. Local businesses showed their support by sponsoring the event, and donations were made in person, by phone and online. Thanks to the support of everyone involved, this year's Radiothon raised more than \$120,000.

A big part of the event is Storm's Angels, a recognition program in memory of a special CMN child, Storm Wood, who passed away in 2019. Storm loved Radiothon and, in the last year of his life, donated \$1,000 of his own money to help other kids. In Storm's honor, every listener who gives \$1,000 or more becomes one of Storm's Angels and is recognized on a plaque proudly displayed at the radio station. This year, 33 generous donors were added to the list, contributing more than \$38,000.
